Our Spotlight Series allows someone established in Canada's literary community to shine a light on work they're excited about. CELEBRATING 20 YEARS OF GRITLIT

gritLIT began in 2004 as the brainchild of Hamilton author Krista Foss. Foss believed Hamilton needed a platform both to host the best established and emerging writers from around the country and to highlight the wealth of homegrown literary talent the city has to offer. Fellow author Rachael Preston took over management in 2005, followed by publisher Noelle Allen (2007-2012) and Artistic Director Jennifer Gillies (2007-present).

Together, they grew gritLIT from a small, intimate weekend of programs at Hamilton's Staircase Theatre to a multi-day, hybrid online and in-person celebration of Canadian writers that attracts virtual audiences from as far away as Australia. This year recorded its biggest in-person event ever with a sold-out reading in Theatre Aquarius's 700-seat venue.

gritLIT thanks all our venue partners, from the Staircase, to the Art Gallery of Hamilton, to the festival's current home, Hamilton Homewood Suites by Hilton. Thank you to our bookstore partners – originally Bryan Prince, Bookseller, and currently Jaime Krakowski from Epic Books. Heartache, disease, new love, death. Our characters often have to navigate life-altering moments right there on the page. As writers, how do we carefully convey the weight of their emotional responses? How do we sidestep clichés, choose revealing prose, and ground the overwhelming feelings of the moment in the truth of our characters? Through prose excerpts, instruction, group discussions, and writing exercises, this highly interactive workshop led by Vincent Anioke will explore various techniques for handling woes, thrills, and joys in ways that feel truthful and engaging.

ALL THE SACRED PARTS

Paige Maylott's My Body Is Distant uses the intersection of virtual and IRL identities to explore true identity. In Falling Back in Love with Being Human, Kai Cheng Thom writes a series of love letters to explore the concept of acceptance and being accepted, flaws and all. Casey Plett sits down with the authors to discuss what it means to love ourselves and others truly and fully, with all our flawed and sacred parts.

SOCIAL MEDIA FOR WRITERS (WRITING WORKSHOP)

Writing is a competitive field, and now more than ever, writers need to know how to build a presence online. Author Jennilee Austria-Bonifacio looks at social media as a tool for writers and discusses creating an authentic voice online, how to use design programs, tips and tricks for different platforms, and strategies for using social media in an intentional way to learn about a subject and connect with new readers. AYOMIDE BAYOWA



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
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CASEY PLETT




